Attentive to the Word

Sunday of Zacchaeus - Feast of the Encounter
1 Timothy 4: 9-15 & Hebrews 7: 7-17
Luke 19: 1-10 & Luke 2: 22-40

The story of Zacchaeus from the Gospel according to St Luke should be familiar to all of us. We read it every year just before the beginning of the Sundays of preparation for Great Lent. It has a powerful message about people's expectations of Jesus, about what we have to do to welcome Jesus, and about what Jesus came into the world to do.

Let's start with the end of the story. That's the "punch line," the sentence that sums up the whole point of the story. Jesus tells Zacchaeus, "The Son of Man came to seek out and to save the lost." In other words, Jesus came into the world to save us sinners from the consequences of our sins. But He didn't come in a passive way, saying, "Here I am; if you want to be saved, come to me and I'll see what I can do for you." No; Jesus said plainly that He came to seek out the lost—He actively looks for the sinners, those in trouble, those who are outsiders. After all, Jesus invited himself to the house of Zacchaeus, because He knew the need was great there.

Of course, Zacchaeus also went to the trouble of seeking Jesus. He had to push through the crowd and even climb a tree just to catch sight of the Lord. He must have had some faith in God, and some awareness of his own sinfulness and need for salvation, or he wouldn't have gone to all that trouble. He wouldn't have done it just out of curiosity. And when Jesus declared that He would come to Zacchaeus' house, Zacchaeus happily welcomed Him. He also promised to give half his money to the poor and to repay 400 percent anyone he had cheated. So his encounter with Jesus did save him. He was lost—apparently in greed and self-absorption—but Jesus sought him out and saved him.

We have it so much easier than Zacchaeus. From the time we are babies most of us are united to Christ in baptism, nourished by Christ's Body and Blood in the Holy Eucharist, surrounded and supported by the Christian community. We don't have to climb a tree to see Jesus; we just have to drive a few miles (or maybe quite a few miles) to church. But we need Jesus as much as Zacchaeus did.

In spite of all our opportunities and advantages, we too are actually lost in sin and in need of salvation. Maybe we don't earn our living by cheating people as Zacchaeus did, but we let our pride and greed and anger damage our relationship with God and with other people. Like Zacchaeus' neighbors, we might grumble about Jesus being the guest of sinners (instead of us holy, pious, righteous people!). Like Zacchaeus, we need to recognize that we are sinners, too. Like Zacchaeus, we need to repent and make amends

for the ways in which we have hurt others and sinned against God. We, too, need to make every effort to seek the Lord, so that He can come to us and say, "Today salvation has come to this house."

FEAST OF THE ENCOUNTER

Our lighted candles are a sign of the divine splendor of the one who comes to expel the dark shadows of evil and to make the whole universe radiant with the brilliance of his eternal light. Our candles also show how bright our souls should be when we go to meet Christ.

The Mother of God, the most pure Virgin, carried the true light in her arms and brought him to those who lay in darkness. We too should carry a light for all to see and reflect the radiance of the true light as we hasten to meet him.

The light has come and has shone upon a world enveloped in shadows; the Dayspring from on high has visited us and given light to those who lived in darkness. This, then, is our feast, and we join in procession with lighted candles to reveal the light that has shone upon us and the glory that is yet to come to us through him. So let us hasten all together to meet our God.

The true light has come, the light that enlightens every man who is born into this

world. Let all of us, my brethren, be enlightened and made radiant by this light. Let all of us share in its splendor, and be so filled with it that no one remains in the darkness. Let us be shining ourselves as we go together to meet and to receive with the aged Simeon the light whose brilliance is eternal. Rejoicing with Simeon, let us sing a hymn of thanksgiving to God, the Father of the light, who sent the true light to dispel the darkness and to give us all a share in his splendor.

Through Simeon's eyes we too have seen the salvation of God which he prepared for all the nations and revealed as the glory of the new Israel, which is ourselves. As Simeon was released from the bonds of this life when he had seen Christ, so we too were at once freed from our old state of sinfulness.

By faith we too embraced Christ, the salvation of God the Father, as he came to us from Bethlehem. Gentiles before, we have now become the people of God. Our eyes have seen God incarnate, and because we have seen him present among us and have mentally received him into our arms, we are called the new Israel. Never shall we forget this

presence; every year we keep a feast in his honor.
